About us

The Oldham County Schools district is located about 20 miles northeast of Louisville and serves nearly 12,000 students. Our district continues be one of the state's best in many areas, including academic performance, college and career readiness, number of National Board Certified staff and teacher satisfaction.

In 2012, OCS was the highest-scoring county school district in Kentucky on the state's assessment test. The district was also named to the 2012 Advanced Placement Honor Roll, the state's only district to earn the honor for three straight years.

We currently have nine elementary schools, four middle schools and three high schools. We also serve students through a preschool, arts center, career center and alternative high school. Students' needs are met through a variety of services, including early literacy intervention, gifted and talented programming, English Language Learners and special education.

School attendance boundaries are based primarily on geographic proximity and having entire neighborhoods attend the same school. Capacity, projected enrollment and special needs/programs also affect student assignment. The district allows for open enrollment as well as intra-district transfers that meet established criteria.

Of our roughly 850 teachers, 22 percent have achieved National Board certification — the highest ratio of any district in the state. Our teachers also rated the district highly in terms of teacher satisfaction on a statewide survey.
